Intelligence Narrative No. 95, Ray Operation 24 October 1943

Twenty-seven B-26's of the 320th Bombardment Group (M) took off this morning to bomb railroad bridge southeast of Orvieto, Italy. They accompanied the 319th Bombardment Group, and were escorted by P-38's of the 1st Fighter Group. Three B-26's returned early, all spares.

The primary target was obscured by cloud cover; the alternate, railroad bridge 6 miles northeast of Orvieto was bombed.

20/25 MG-109's and PR-190's were encountered in the target area; 5 were destroyed; 3 were probably destroyed and 1 was damaged.

Twenty-three B-26's landed safely at Decimomannu A/D, Sardinia and returned to this base on schedule. One B-26 landed at Alghero A/D, Sardinia due to lack of fuel, and is now there with a collapsed nosegear.

Routes and Altitudes:

To target: From rendezvous with 319th Group at base at 3000; 14° T to rendezvous with escort at Cape Zebib, 300 statute miles; 32° T for 20 statute miles to western tip of Lake Bolsena climbing gradually to 10500; abortive bomb run on primary target 82° T for 20 statute miles at 10000; bomb run of 319th Group, 100° T for 20 statute miles to Terni; curve left, bomb run on target bombed at 10000.

From target: 60 statute miles to Lake Bolsena; 222° T for 20 statute miles; 216° T for 248 statute miles to Decimomannu A/D, dropping gradually to 3000.

From Decimomannu A/D: 163° T for 143 statute miles to base, at 2500.

Bombs: 108 x 1000-lb. demolition bombs, 1/10 and .025 second delay fuses, carried by 27 B-26's.
12 x 1000-lb. demolition bombs returned to base in B-26's that returned early.
60 x 1000-lb. demolition bombs dropped over the target area.
8 x 1000-lb. demolition bombs salvaged in sea after the target, having not been dropped because element leaders did not drop.
28 x 1000-lb. demolition bombs carried to Decimomannu A/D, having not been dropped because target was not identified in time.

Chronology: Time off between 0900 and 0913; rendezvous with 319th Group and on course 0935; rendezvous with escort 0945; target 1152; down at Decimomannu A/D Sardinia between 1331 and 1343; down at base between 1524 and 1625.

Results: The target bombed was obscured by bomb bursts from bombing of B-25's. Some bombs were reported landing on top of these bursts and others across the railroad tracks north of the target. Most bombs were wide of the target.

Flak: 3 bursts of heavy flak were seen above a point northwest of Mancina at 1155 at the formation's altitude, but several miles north. They appeared

to be directed at E/A that were maneuvering in and out of clouds in that vicinity.

Enemy Aircraft: 1) 20/25 ME-109's and FW-190's attacked in the target area; 5/6 before the bomb run and 15/20 on leaving the coast after the bombing. 5 were destroyed, 5 were probably destroyed and one was damaged without loss.

2) 21 A/C on Orvieto A/D were seen at 1152 from 10000.
3) Two aerial bomb bursts above and to the right of the formation with heavy black bursts in the vicinity of the target.

Enemy Aircraft Tactics: 2 ME-109's came in from the left on the approach to the target and fired shells into the rear of the formation from 1000 yds. range. The shells left white trails from the firing A/C until exploded near our formation with large black bursts; the shells are presumed to be either rockets or 37 mm. cannon shells.

Other attacks were made principally from 5 to 6 o'clock level, with a few at 11 o'clock high and one at 3 o'clock. They were, generally speaking, not aggressive; only about half closing to 300 yds. E/A made use of cloud cover in making approaches.

Enemy shipping: 1 large M/V in Civitavecchia Harbor was seen at 1135 from 9500.

General Observations:

1) 5 M/T were observed northwest of Montalle di Castro, headed north, were seen at 1138 from 10000.

2) 3 M/T were seen headed south 5 miles south of Ficulle at 1152 from 10000.

3) A convoy about one mile long was seen stopped in the road between Canine and Valentano at 1140 from 10000.

4) 40/50 railroad cars in the M/T at Gemini were seen at 1153 from 10000.

5) A large ammunition factory and dump was seen at 42° 42' N, 12° 39' E at 1150 from 10000.

Our Losses: None. 3 B-26's slight damaged by E/A fire. One B-26 collapsed nosegear on landing at Elmas A/D, Sardinia; crew is believed safe.

Victories: 5 ME-109's destroyed; 5 ME-109's probably destroyed; 2 ME-109's and 1 FW-190 damaged.

Weather: En route CAVU and scattered cumulus; target much ground fog, 4/10 cumulus at 5000'; return as en route with a frost just east of Sardinian coast.

Comments: None.
