Intelligence Narrative No. 126, Day Operations, 8 January 1944.

Flight Commander: Major McCrory.

1. 320th Bombardment Group (M).

2. At 1040 hours, 28 B-26's took off to bomb Siena M/Y, Italy, but found the target obscured by clouds and Grosseto M/Y, Italy was bombed instead. They were unescorted. 1 B-26 returned early because of engine trouble. 26 B-26's dropped 152 x 500 lb. demolition bombs (1/10 -.025) second delay fuses on the target at 1243 hours from 9500'. 1 B-26 salvoed over Italy, 6 x 500 lb. demolition bombs which hung up over the target. 2 x 500 lb. demolition bombs which hung up over the target were also salvoed by one of the a/c that bombed the target. The early return salvoed 6 x 500 lb. demolition bombs over water. 2 x 500 lb. demolition bombs were returned to this base also having hung up. 27 B-26's returned safely to this base at 1436 hours.

3. Results: A good pattern of bombs bracketed the north choke point at the M/Y with some bombs over. A damaging near-miss was scored on the transformer station. There was at least one hit on the military installations at N/35 (TC 3-38 4MA). The bridge was missed.

4. Observations: a. General: (1) Grosseto M/Y were observed to be well cratered and badly damaged with about a dozen wrecked cars present at 1243 from 9500'.

(2) A blue flash was seen coming from the area where the transformer station is located at the target at 1243 from 9500'.
(3) 20/25 tank cars were seen at Fallonica M/Y at 1242 from 10000'.

(4) 20/25 cars were reported by 1 cr-w at Montepescali at 1242 from 10000'.
(5) 15 cars, camouflaged, were seen northwest of Gavarrano at 1242 from 10000'.
(6) scattered M/T activity was observed on the roads surrounding the target at 1243 from 9500'.
(7) 12 M/T were seen near Gavarrano at 1243 from 9500'.

(8) Evidence of a military camp was observed 6/8 miles northeast of Grosseto at 1244 from 9500'.
(9) Layers of smoke were seen from Piombino at 1225 from 10000'.

b. Enemy Air: (1) None encountered.
(2) 1 S/S a/c unidentified was seen headed south at 2000' across Arbetello at 1225 from 9500'.
(3) Grosseto A/D appeared unserviceable at 1243 from 9500'.

c. Enemy Air Tactics: None.

d. Enemy Shipping: (1) 3 large fishing vessels were seen anchored at mouth of river south of Fallonica at 1242 from 10000'.
(2) 7 small fishing boats were seen in the cove just north of Cape Ala Sparviero at 1242 from 10000'.
(3) 4 small boats were seen in Piombino Harbor at 1231 from 10000'.

(4) 4 Med. M/V and 3 small boats were seen in Giglio Harbor at 1217 from 10000'.
(5) 4 barges were seen at Castiglione di Pescaia at 1225 from 10000'.

(6) 1 beached barge, it's deck covered with cargo, was seen just north of Talamone at 1225 from 10000'.

a. Flak: None.
I. Our Losses: None.

5. Routes and Altitudes: From this base at 2500', 24° T for 250 statute miles; 18° T for 32 statute miles; 208° T for 49 statute miles to 42°43'N, 10°49'E, climbing gradually to 10000'; bomb run 80° M for 15 statute miles to the target at 9500'; breakaway left; 204° for 250 statute miles, descending to 2500' at this base.

6. Weather Encountered: Enroute: CAVU, light haze.

Target: Overcast stratocumulus, tops 6000', north of an east-west line 10 miles north of Grosseto; scattered south of line.
Return: As enroute.

7. Comments: Target analysis at critique revealed that the lead bombardier saw that the yards were already demolished, and he held his bombs, aiming them at a point on the tracks 2000 yards northwest of the yards. These bombs missed. These facts were not stated at interrogation.
