HEADQUARTERS 320TH BOMBARDMENT GROW (M) Office of the Group Intelligence Officer APO 520

Intelligence Marrative No 143, Day Operation, 29 January 1944

Flight Commander: Major Marble.

A. 320th Bombardment Group (M).

B. At 1210 hours, 36 B-26's of the 320th Bombardment Group (M) took off to bomb the Manziana RR Bridge, Italy. They rendevoued with Spitfire escort over Italy. 1 B-26 returned early with engine trouble. 35 B-26's were over the target and 31 B-26's dropped 120 x 1000 lb. demolition bombs (1/10 - .025 second delay fuses) at 1417 hours from 10500'. 4 x 1000'lb. demolition bombs were salvoed over land; 1 having hung and 3 due to bombadier error. 16 x 1000 lb. demolition bombs were returned to this base because the flight leaders bombadier did not identify the target. 32 B-26's returned to this base at 1550 hours. 1 B-26 is missing;

2 B-26's were lost to E/A. The crew of one B-26 is safe.

A/C Battle #39 was hit in the bomb bay, north of Rome/Littorio M/Y, which knocked out the electrical system, generator box, and inverter. A/c remained in formation until on the bomb run, a/c was then attacked by enemy fighters, attacks of which severed all centrol cables leading from the centrol columns and damaged all other controls, with the exception of the left throttle and elevator trim tabs. The pilot gave the signal to prepare to abandon ship, but on discovery that one of the crew members was dazed and injured, and that the a/c would be flown with trim tabs and partial remaining rudder control, the order was cancelled. The a/c was unable to stay in formation, but immediately was flown to the coast. Just before reaching the coast, Battle #41, apparently in trouble with bomb bay doors still open, flame coming from them and the a/c weaving up and down, pulled along side Battle #39. A few seconds after leaving the coast, the pilot of #41 succeeded in closing his bomb bay doors and turned southeast toward land, hitting the water 1 mile off the coast of Ladispoli. 7 parishutes were seen to open before the a/c went in. Two parichutes were reported fighting on land and the others on the water. 8/12 ME-109's and FW-190's attacked both B-26's from the target to the point where #41 turned; 3 E/A stayed with #39 for a few miles and one, flying lazy-eights apparently out of ammunition , stayed with #39 for 10 minutes past the coast; the remaining E/A followed #41. Attacks were made from 6 o'clockunder to the left. #39 was flown to Corsica, and all crew members parichuted safely over Ghisonaccia A/D. 3 crew members were injured and 1 crew member was slightly injured in this a/c. [A/C Battle #68 was attacked by fighters just after making the turn north of Rome at 1412 hours. Its tail was partly shot away and one engine caught on fire. The pilot stayed in formation until about 15 miles West of the coast, then headed for Corsica with an escorte of 3 B-26's, No radio contact could be made with it by the escort and escort saw it go down to 2000', fall sharply to 1100', and explode at 1445 at 41°30'N, 11°05'E. No chutes were seen. An oil slick and one Mae West, partially on fire, was seen.

C. Results: An excellent concentration of bombs bracketed the target with two direct hits on the south end of the bridge and one direct hit on the north end. The approaches were well covered with two direct hits on each approach.

D. Observations:

- 1. Air: a. Air Activity:

 (1) 10/12 ME-109's and 1 FW-190 attacked the rear of the formation starting in the vicinity of the Littoric M/Y, prior to the bomb run and continuing after the breakaway and to the coast. Most of the E/A were a blueish slate color; some had yellow spinners; I had square stabelizers; one was observed with a black cross with a yellow border, a yellow J and black P just behind the cross. The attacks were made from above and from 5 to 7 o'clock, in pairs, 4s and 6s crossing and heading downward. Several attacks were made from 11 to 1 o'clock high and low, and 1 approach was made by 5 a/c from 3 o'clock which did not press home the attack. Most of the attacks were pressed up to 250 yards and in two instances up to 50 yerds. Red cannon fire was observed and the use of possible rockets reported which severely damaged B-26, Battle #68, destroying its right elevator and alleron and damaging its left flap. Attacks took place between 1412 and 1430 hours from 10 to 11000'. Our gunners destroyed 2 ME-109's and probably destroyed 1 ME-109.

(1) 175/200 RR cars were seen in the M/Y, and a supply dump was observed on the left side of the yards at Littorio M/Y at 1411 from 10500'.

(2) 25/30 RR cars consisting of 5 strings were seen at Furbara at 1427 from 9000'.

- (3) 1 train of several cars was seen miving south, south of Lake Bracciano at 1415 from 11000'.
- (4) 10/12 HR cars, standing, and a 3/4 car train mowing south was seen at Castelnuovo at 1414 from 10500'.

(5) 15 M/T, standing, were seen at 41055'N, 12012'H, at 1407 from 11000'.

- (6) 10/15 M/T, scattered, were seen between Lake Brasciano and 12 miles south at 1416 from 10500'.
- (7) 8 M/T hauling trailers were seen moving towards home on the road northwest of Rome at 1415 from 11000'.
- (8) 30/35 M/T and troops were seen parked on the road 5 miles east of Palo at 1427 from 10000'.
- (9) 12 M/T moving south were seen at Castelnuovo at 1413 from 10500'.
- (10) 8/10 M/T were seen parked South of Formello at 1415 from 10500'.
- (11) 10 RR cars were seen at 42000'N, 12023'E, at 1414 from 10500'.
 c. Flak:
- (1) a. Home Littorie area. b. At target. c. East side of Lake Bracciano.

(3) Heavy at a. and c.; light at b. and d..

(7) a. Six . b. Normal heavy with few red bursts at Rome/Littorio. c. Red bursts may have signaled E/A that heavy flak was to stop.

(8) None observed.

d. Shipping:
(1) 1 medium M/V was seen moving northwest off Furbara at 1400 from 11000'.

(2) 3 medium M/V were seen moving west, 2 north, at 41°44'N, 12°01'E, at 1400 from 11000'.

(3) 5 barges in Rome were seen unloading on the east bank of the Tiber River at 1411 from 10500.

(4) 2 barges were seen at the mouth of the Tiber River at 1400 from 11000'.
(5) 1 large M/V was seen afire between the mouth of the Tiber River and Anzio at 1400 from 11000'.

3. Losses: 1 B-26 was lost due to E/A and flak; 2 B-26's were lost due to E/A; 1 B-26 was damaged and 1 B-26 slightly damaged by flak. 13 crew members are missing; 4 crew members were injured by flak.

4. Weather: Enroute: Over water, overcast, stratus, base 3000', tops 4000', breaking to clear 10 miles off coast of Italy. Visibility unkimited.

Target: CAVU. One patch of thin stratus.at 1500'

observed 4/5 miles northeast of target.

Return: No change.

E. Routes and Altitudes: From this base at 2500', 42° T for 242 statutes miles to Ladispoli; 62° T for 18 statute miles to Formella, IP, climbing gradually to 11000'; 289° M for 14 statute miles to the target at 10500'; breakaway left; 180° T for 12 statute miles to Ladispoli; 222° T for 242 statute miles, descending to 2500' at this base.

F. Comments: 2 ME-109's were destroyed and 1 ME-109 was probably destroyed.
