HEADQUARTERS 320TH BOMBARDMENT GROUP (M) Office of the Group Intelligence Officer APO 650

Intelligence Narrative No. 159, Day Operation, 3 March 1944

Flight Commander: Captain Speegle.

- A. 320th Bombardment Group (M).
- B. At 0904 hours, 28 B-26's of the 320th Bombardment Group (M) took off to bomb the Ostionse M/Y, Mome, Italy. They were escorted by Spitfires of the 52nd Fighter Group. 4 B-26's returned early; spares. 24 B-26's were ever the target and 22 B-26's dropped 131 x 500 lb. demolition bombs (1/10 - .025 and mixed delay fuses), on the target at 1124 hours from 11,100'. 7 x 500 lb. demolition bombs were salvoed in the water: 1 (1/10 - .025) because of rack malfunction and 6 (mixed delay) because a/c was not in a position to drop. 6 x 500 lb. demolition bombs (1/10 - .025) second delay fuses, were returned to this base because they hung up. 23 B-26's returned safely to this base at 1324 hours. 1 B-26 returned late at 1724 hours after landing at Chisonaccia, Corsica, for gas.
- C. Results: The bombs started at K-11 cf. TC 3-136A-NA and walked southeastward through the center of the Marshalling Yards, destroying the Ferrovia Ostiae and Ostiense stations and at least 75 of the 180 MR cars in the area. Several fires, one from an oil tank, were observed.

D. Observations: 1. Air:

a. Air Activity: None.

B. Situation:

- (1) A new dirt runway running NW/SE was observed at Cerveteri at 1127 hours from 10,8001.
- (2) 3 S/E and 1 T/E a/c were seen dispersed along the river on Littoric A/D at 1127 hours from 10,800°.

2. Ground:

a. General: A Spitfire was seen to burst into flames and explode over Manicomio at 1132 hours from 10,500'. Reason unknown.

b. Communications:

(1) The target appeared 75% full at the time of the attack.

(2) Lorenzo M/Y appeared full at 1125 hours from 10,800'.

- (3) 1-B of Lorenzo M/Y, cf. TC 3-136A-NA, was observed to have about 200 cars at 1125 hours from 10.800'.
- (4) 3 strings of 40/50 flat cars each were seen in the passenger yards of Lorenze M/Y at 1125 hours from 10,800'.

(5) An uncounted number of cars were seen in Tiburtina M/Y at 1126 hours from

(6) 2/3 strings of passenger cars of 10/15 cars each were observed in Litterio M/Y at 1127 hours from 10,600'.

(7) 1 train of 10/15 cars with steam up, facing south, was seen at F-4673 at 1112 hours from 12,000'.

(8) 10 cars, stationary, were seen on the tracks below F-4673 at 1112 hours from 12,0001.

(9) 40 care were seen in the M/Y at Marcarese at 1113 hours from 12,000'.

(10) Moderate traffic was observed on the road between Rome and Pale at 1134 hours from 10,500'.

- c. Flak: No flak was experienced from landfall to target or on the bomb run. Slight to Moderate, heavy, accurate for altitude, inaccurate for deflection, continuously pointed flak was experienced from guns around Centocelle A/D on breakaway until Littorio. Intense inaccurate small arms fire came from the streets around the target.
- d. Shipping: 1 medium M/V was seen inside the mole of Civitavecchia harbor at 1108 hours from 12,000'.
 - 3. Losses: No 5-26's were lost or damaged.
- 4. Weather: Enroute: Few bands of scattered cumulus, base 3,000', tops 5,000'. 8/10 altostratus and cirrus above 15,000'. Visibility unlimited. Target: 3-4/10 cumulus, base 3,000'., tops 5,000'. 6-8/10 altostratus and cirrus above 15,000'. Visibility unlimited. Return: No change.
- E. RCUTES AND ALTITUDES: From this base at 2,500', 120° T for 37 statute miles to C. Carbenera, 10° T for 227 statute miles to Montecristo Island for rendezvous at 7,000'; 106° T for 96 statute miles to the UF, IF, at Falo, climbing gradually to 12,000'; 107° Min for 20 statute miles to target at 11,100'; break left; 268° T for 20 statute miles to coast just S of Falo; 223° T for 241 statute miles to base, lowering gradually to 2,500'.

SUBJECT: Lead Navigator's Report.

TO : Commanding General, 42nd Wing (US), AFO 650, US ARMY

- 1. The 320th Bomb Group, with Captain C. E. Speegle as flight commande left the Base, following the 319th Bomb Group at 1029 on a course of 120° T to a point two miles south of the Island of dei Cavoli at which time we altered course to 10° T easing at times to maintain our position behind the 319th Bomb Gp.
- 2. Arriving at our 0.P. Montecristo Island at 1058, at which place we picked up our Spitfire fighter cover and porceeded altering course to 106° T. Made landfall three miles south of Palo, I.P. at 1020 altered course to 95°, in order to bring formation over target on the planned axis, at 1021 altered course to 105° T going over target and dropping bombs at 1024. The actual bomb run, due to evasive action was 43 seconds.
- 3. Broke sharp left. Picked up flak from Centocelle area. Left coast at 1131 on course of 270° T to avoid clouds. At 1145 altered course to 205° T making landfall at Cape Carbonera at 1239. Altered course to 295° T. Over the field at 1253. All but one ship returned shortage of gasoline the only known reason. Mission successful.

SUBEJCT: Mission Report.

TO : Operations Officer, 320th Bomb Gp, (M) AAF, APO 650, U.S. Army.

Today's raid on the Mershalling yards at Rome was started by a very complete briefing because of the danger of damaging world famous religious buildings that were near the target area.

At our IP, a point on the Italian coast, we turned in toward our target, following the 319th Group, with a cover of Spitfires overhead. At first it was impossible to pickup the city of Rome due to cloud cover but as we drew nearer the Tiber river was easily picked up and the general location of our target was determined from the curves in the river. About a minute from the target we could distinguish it fairly well though a cloud was over the first part and billows of black smoke covered the rest due to the bombs dropped by the 319th Group. Our target was long and narrow and due to our axis of attack, it was necessary to have our drift completely killed.

From the coast in we were flying mild evasive action. The interphone was used to make all course corrections until we went on P.D.I. for a run of about thirty seconds. As the bombs dropped we broke sharply to the left around and over the city to avoid the flak which the 319th Gp. was getting because they didn't break fast enough. Our flight's bombs dropped a little short but the other flights did an excellent job.

The Navigator, Lt. Taranto, did a fine job of navigation and gave me every cooperation. The Pilot, Lt. Saylor, did a faultless job of flying and leading.
