Intelligence Narrative No. 921, Day Operation, 21 August 1944.

Flight Commander: Lt. Birmingham.

A. 320th Bombardment Group (M).

B. At 1601 hours, 13 B-26's took off to bomb the Road Bridge north of Orizzana (W/R: (W) L-765246; GSOs 4164, sheet 98), Italy. 1 B-26 returned early which was a spare. 12 B-26's were over the target, on two runs, but no bombs were dropped due to inability to identify the target because of late afternoon shadows and haze. The formation was over the target at 1805 hours and 1816 hours from 12,000' to 11,200' on axes of 292° T and 105° T. All bombs carried by A/C which have returned to base were returned. 7 B-26's returned to base at 2010 hours. 3 B-26's returned late by 2200 hours after landing at Grosseto due to flak damage. 1 B-26 is at Grosseto with flak damage. 1 B-26 lost to flak. Over Pratovecchio A/C Battle No. 29 sustained a first hit which damaged one engine. A second hit on the wing damaged the gas tank serving the other engine. A/C radioed that it was losing gas and left the formation. A flight of 3 other A/C followed. A stream of gas was seen coming from the A/C, but there was no fire as long as the A/C continued in flight. At 1700 hours, 8 miles east of Sassocorvaro (43° 47' N, 12° 38' E), with A/C flying 175° T at 5,000' the crew members bailed out. 7 chutes, accounting for the entire crew were seen to leave the A/C by crew members observing. The A/C continued for 1.5 to 2.0 miles in a steep glide, one wing hit a mountain, and the A/C exploded and burned at approximately 43° 40' N, 12° 40' E.

C. RESULTS: None.

D. OBSERVATIONS:

1. Air: a. Enemy Air: The gunners on one crew reported seeing 4 FW190's low, below the formation which made no repeat no passes, and 3 ME 109's which made 1 pass each to 300 yards at 9 o'clock, but did not fire, between Mardi and the target area at 1800 hours. The FW 190's were described as black, German crosses and were claimed to have been seen on wings. The ME 109's were reported to have yellow ballies. Other crews asserted that these A/C were clipped wing spitfires and P-47's.

b. Situation: Pavullo nel Frignano empty.

2. Ground: a. General: None.

b. Communications: None.

c. Flak: Pratovecchio area - slight, heavy, accurate, Fairly accurate, CP. Bursts of 3 and 4 encountered both coming in and out. Piranella Area, slight to moderate, heavy, accurate, accurate, CP. Praduro east Sasso, slight to moderate, heavy, accurate, accurate, CP. 3 H at P-772 Both 88 mm. and 105 mm. bursts were seen.

d. Shipping: None.

3. Losses: 1 to flak. Damaged; 6 due to flak.

4. Weather:

- a. Enroute: Clear but hazy.
- b. Target: Clear by hazy.
- c. Return: As enroute.

E. ROUTES: Base to mouth of Ombrone River; to Montevarchi; to Portico di Romagna; to Monghidoro; first bomb run to 4 miles west S. Benedetto Val Di Sambro; to Lecano; to Firenzuola; to Montevarchi; Reciprocal course to base.
